COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course provides an overview of the scientific study of human behavior. Topics include history, methodology, biopsychology, sensation, perception, learning, motivation, cognition, abnormal behavior, personality theory, social psychology, and other relevant topics. Upon completion, students should be able to demonstrate a basic knowledge of the science of psychology. This course has been approved to satisfy the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement general education core requirement in social/behavioral sciences.

LEARNING/TEACHING METHODS: This course will be taught in a lecture/discussion format. Additional ideas may be discussed which are not found in the text including material found in outside reading assignments as assigned. Students are expected to keep up with assignments (weekly discussion boards, homework and weekly quiz) and are encouraged to ask questions when material covered is not clearly understood. Class participation by the student is an efficient method of learning and its importance cannot be overstressed. Students will be expected to participate in relevant class activities as scheduled.

ASSESMENTS/METHODS OF EVALUATION: To demonstrate attainment in program and learning outcomes for Psychology 150, you must achieve an overall average of C (70) or better and this grading scale is based on a 10 point scale. To achieve these outcomes, you must successfully complete the following:

<u>Discussion Boards/Icebreakers:</u> Icebreaker (on discussion board) Discussion Boards (15)

Outside Reading Assignment/Individual Project: Research Paper (1/4 of your grade)

Quizzes: There will be a quiz on each learning module - a total of 14. Quizzes are done basically on a weekly basis. Review in the Assignments section the Schedule of Assignment for the specific days that you must have completed the quiz.

<u>Homework:</u> There will be a homework assignment each week/chapter - there is a total of 14 homeworks.

GRADING POLICY: To receive credit for this course, you must complete:

- 14 total discussion boards
 - 1 Icebreaker Discussion Boards (value 20 points)
 - Discussion Boards on Chapters (13 total 20 points each) Reply to discussion boards/ 2 classmates each time (part of discussion board grade)
- 13 Quizzes (10 points each, total value is 130 points)
- 13 Homework Assignments (1 per chapter) (10 points each, total value of 130 points)
- **Research Paper** (Value 135 points)

Items are due by the dates/times on date stated. No late assignments accepted! I will check on the time/date so don't post or send anything late, as it will NOT be counted!

If you miss more than 2 weeks of assignments - you are required to drop the course, as you cannot make up that much missed material. If you do not drop the course, you will earn an F. Regardless of the points you've earned inactivity for 2 or more weeks, without contact to the instructor regarding your absence will result in a failing grade in this course.

An inactivity of more than 2 weeks without explanation may result in being dropped from the course or receiving an F.

Students must be present at least one class during first ten percent (10%) of the course in order to be considered enrolled in the class. If a student has not attended at least one class by the ten percent census date, the instructor will administratively withdraw the student.
