PROGRAM TITLE: College Transfer

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is a study of human growth and development. Emphasis is placed on major theories and perspectives as they relate to the physical, cognitive, and psychosocial aspects of development from conception to death. Upon completion, students should be able to demonstrate knowledge of development across the life span. *This course has been approved to satisfy the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement general education core requirement in social/behavioral sciences.*

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. Demonstrate appropriate mathematical skills required for academic and work- related tasks.
- 2. Apply principles of sound critical thinking to analyze and solve problems and make logical decisions.
- 3. Demonstrate effective speaking, writing and reading skills.
- 4. Demonstrate appropriate technology skills required for academic and work-related tasks.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Discuss theories, research and applications in the field of developmental psychology.
- 2. Explain the developmental theories as they relate to physical, cognitive, and psychosocial aspects of development from conception to death.
- 3. Discuss how cultural factors relevant to development both unite and diversify our society.

LEARNING/TEACHING METHODS: This course will be taught in a lecture/discussion format. Students are expected to read the chapter to be discussed before coming to class. Students are responsible for all material presented in the class including videos, hand-outs, etc.

ASSESSMENTS

1. <u>TESTS:</u> There will be four tests. Tests will consist of multiple choice questions. Tests will cover all assigned readings, outside reading assignments, videos, discussions in the class. You should make every effort to take the test during the scheduled time period. To be considered for a make up test, you must present a legitimate documentation (doctor's note, court documentation etc.). You must make up the test within one week.

- 2. <u>QUIZZES:</u> There will be a quiz for every unit that will be covered. Quizzes will consist of 10 or 15 multiple choice and fill in the blank, short answer questions. Quizzes will be on Blackboard. If you don't take the quizzes by due dates, you will get a zero.
- 3. DISCUSSION BOARD ASSIGNMENTS: There will be discussion board assignments for every unit covered. Outside reading materials will be assigned for discussion board assignments.

The lowest quiz grade will be dropped.
