The BLET program is offered through MCC's Division of Continuing Education. The cadets have already taken the State Comprehensive Examination. Cooper has accepted a position with the Robersonville Police Department and Dunlow has joined the Ahoskie Police Department.

The NC BLET program covers 620 hours of study within 36 total blocks of instruction including; Physical Fitness, Firearms, Law Enforcement Driving Training, Laws of Arrest, Search and Seizure, Motor Vehicle Law, Techniques of Traffic Enforcement, Patrol Techniques, Sheriff's Responsibilities, Rapid Deployment, etc. The course contains the most current law enforcement information available and is filled with practical BLET Cont. next page ...

exercises and an extensive ethics section that is woven throughout the training experience. It takes approximately 16 weeks to complete and concludes with a comprehensive written exam and skills testing. This course of study is mandated by the state for all certified law enforcement officers.

A new BLET class will be starting on February 12. Those interested in applying for admission to the BLET program must complete and submit a packet of information and forms prior to starting the class. ### **MCC's PTA Students take the President's Adult Fitness Test**



MCC's entire PTA (Physical Therapist Assistant) class participated in the President's Adult Fitness Test on February 20. The students take the test at the beginning and end of spring semester. They are assessed on: How many sit ups they can do in a minute; How many push ups they can do in a minute; Flexibility through a V-sit reach; and Time in walking 1 mile or running 1.5 mile. The current President's Physical Fitness Test was adopted nationwide during the Obama Administration. It is an updated, adult version from the one first introduced during the Kennedy administration.

The students take the test to make them aware of how physically fit they are. This is important because it takes a lot of physical work to treat some patients. Also, the experience provides the students with direct knowledge of what baseline physical fitness is and helps them with encouraging patients to be more active and fit. According to their instructor, Dawn Parker, "I tell them that if they want their bodies to do more, they have to demand more. If they improve their fitness after the second test, I give them extra credit. So far, nearly every student improves, every year."

## **MCC Trustee's Meeting Conducted on January 15**

The MCC Board of Trustees met on January 15 on the College's campus in Williamston. Chairman of the Board, Dwayne Baker, called the meeting to order.

The first order of business was the swearing in of Mr. Clarence Pointe as a new Trustee. He was appointed by the Martin County Board of Education to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Willie Peele for the July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2019 term.


Pointe, the youngest of eight siblings and a native of Jacksonville, NC, attended Fayetteville State University (FSU) on a track scholarship and earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Health and Physical Education. He earned honors in both football and track while attending FSU. He also earned a Master of Arts in Education and Supervision from Pembroke State University.

After 11 years of coaching and teaching, Pointe worked as an Assistant Principal at Williamston High School and later served as a Principal at several Martin County Schools. After 32.5 years in the NC Public Schools system, he retired in 2007.

Pointe currently serves as the President of the Fayetteville State University Alumni Chapter (Martin County branch) and a member of the National Alumni Association of Fayetteville State University.

- December 18, 2018 Special Called Meeting Minutes MCC President, Dr. Paul Hutchins, updated the board on the following items:
- Reviewed the proposed SGA Constitution and Bylaws and asked the Board to consider adoption and immediate implementation. Both were unanimously approved.
- Expressed his gratitude to MCC's faculty and staff for the smooth start of the spring 2019 semester. As of January 11, the unduplicated headcount was at 747 with FTE of 249.16 which places the College on par with the spring 2018 enrollment of 754 with an FTE of 253.16.
- President Hutchins reported that he has met with all fulltime faculty and staff mem-

bers and found it to be a rewarding and enjoyable venture.

- Reported that the Foundation's Campus Fund Drive ended with 93% participation and a total of \$11,259 in donations and pledges to support MCC scholarships. He thanked everyone who contributed.
- Informed the Board that MCC had been notified via email from Dr. Tony Reggi, at the NC Community College System Office that the College, as a recipient of federal funds, is subject to Methods of Administration civil rights monitoring as per a requirement of the Carl Perkins grant. This monitoring is based upon plans developed by the MOA Coordinator for

NCCCS that are reviewed and approved by the Office of Civil Rights. The monitoring visit will take place Feb. 19-21.

- Shared that work continues on developing MCC projects that would merit pursuing an EDA (Economic Development Agency) grant this spring. It is his plan to bring to the Board a recommendation to the March Board meeting.
- President Hutchins called on Mrs. Vanessa Tripp to update the Board on her role as a Counselor and the SGA Advisor.

Following the President's report, the Trustees voted on the following items (please note that these items have not received final approval through adoption of the January 15 minutes):

- Upon recommendation of the Property and Grounds Committee, a motion was made and seconded to accept the committee's recommended bid for the Fire Training Facility in the amount of \$926,217. The motion was unanimously approved.
- The Budget and Finance Committee recommended that MCC adopt the 2019 IRS Mileage Rates. This was approved unanimously.
- Unanimously adopted a revised Travel Policy.
- Unanimously authorized the movement of eligible scholarships and endowments from the College to the College's Foundation.
- Unanimously approved the 2019 Spring Semester SGA Budget in the amount of \$4,500.
- Unanimously adopted the Pro-

curement (P-card) Policy and Procedures with the addition of verbiage for accidental usage.

 The Personnel Committee the adoption of the proposed Performance Appraisal Policy and Procedure Instrument. The motion was unanimously ratified.

The next regularly scheduled meeting is set for 7 p.m. on 3/19/19, Bertie campus in Windsor.

## Apply now for the Criminal Justice Fellows Program



The Criminal Justice Standards Division of North Carolina is now offering a 100% forgivable loan to go to any North Carolina Community College student to acquire an Associate in Applied Sciences (AAS) degree for criminal justice. The loan will be forgiven upon four years of working in an eligible criminal justice profession and county.

#### Mission

The mission of the North Carolina Criminal Justice Fellows Program is to recruit talented high school seniors and graduates into the criminal justice profession. Each year, this program will fund fellowships for scholars who have exhibited high academic achievement, a history of service to the school and community, and a desire to serve the state of North Carolina in a field within the criminal justice profession.

Criminal justice professions include; State and local sworn law enforcement officers, state correctional officers, state juvenile justice officers, correctional officers maintained by local governments and juvenile justice agencies, sworn Sheriffs and Deputy Sheriffs, Detention Officers, and Telecommunicators under direct supervision of a law enforcement agency.

The Criminal Justice Fellows Program was established to assist students in achieving their goal of becoming a criminal justice professional. **The application process** has been extended to April 30th, 2019. The application can be found on the Department of Justice Website: www.ncdoj.gov.

Applicants will be notified of their selection of a fellowships no later than June 1st of each year.

Applicants must submit the following with their applications; SAT/ACT scores, GPA, School and community service/activities.

References from professionals such as teachers, counselors, school resource officers, police chiefs, Sheriffs, etc., attesting to the applicant's potential for excellence in the criminal justice profession must also be submitted with the application.

The total value of the fellowships will be \$3,152.00. This may be used for costs tuition, fees, books and other supplies for both semesters.

Among the eligible counties are: Martin, Bertie, Washington, Beaufort, Edgecombe, and Halifax.

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## **MCC Improvements are "Signs" of the Times!**

Bertie Campus



On March 13, MCC's new electronic sign on the Bertie Campus went live. It is roughly half the size of the signs on the Martin County campus but certainly lights up the corner of Granville and Sterlingworth Streets in Windsor. According to Mr. Norman Cherry, the Director of the Bertie Campus, "It's only been up a week and it's already attracting inquiries about our programs and services. We've even seen people just park outside and watch the messages rotate through. It's a great addition to our campus!" The Bertie sign is pictured above in its various stages of construction and middle right displaying one of its messages.

In February, the sign in front of building one, on the Martin County Campus, was removed in preparation for construction a new sign. The maintenance department constructed a mock sign in the same dimensions as the proposed sign and sat it in place to give decision makers an idea of its scale and position in relationship to the building. The new sign will not have an electronic panel but will make the name of the college immediately visible to campus traffic. Dominion Power will be removing the lamp post in the middle of the sign site and replace it with two lights on either side of the sign, at the edges of the sidewalk corners. All of the lighting along the sidewalk will be upfitted with energy efficient LED bulbs. This will result in brighter lighting and energy savings for the College. Work on the sign should be completed bt the end of the 2018 - 19 Fiscal Year.



## **MCC's 32nd Annual Black History Celebration was Inspirational!**

MCC's 32nd Annual Black History Month Celebration was successfully held on February 21st, in the MCC campus auditorium. This year's theme was "Strong Roots / Amazing Achievements."

The event featured several incredibly talented local youth who highlighted the legacies of inspirational leaders, like Rosa Parks, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and Aretha Franklin (just to name a few). MCC's Information Technology Director, Elijah Freeman, served as the event's emcee.

Following an invocation by Bishop Jerry M. McCrary (also the Mayor of Parmele) and a welcome from SGA President Princess Foster, the Riverside Gospel Choir of Williamston kicked off the event with a celebration in song.

The children from Smiling Faces Childcare Center in Williamston then performed a tribute to Rosa Parks. Parks, considered by many to be the "first-lady of civil rights," made history on December 1, 1955, in Montgomery, Alabama, when she rejected bus driver James F. Blake's order to relinguish her seat in the "colored section" to a white passenger, after the whites-only section was filled. In keeping with Parks' legacy, the students impressed the audience with a number of memorized quotes by Civil Rights activists and leaders.

The group, "All God's Children" from Jamesville then performed "Excerpts from a King." This group was comprised of brothers and sister, Nathanial, Daniel and Joyce Moore, and Javian McMillan. Each of the Moore children portrayed a famous leader during the Civil Rights Movement. Daniel assumed the persona of Dr. King, Nathanial quoted Robert Kennedy and Joyce was Aretha Franklin. Young McMillan served as an emcee, tying the three characters together within the context of the era.

The Right Now Praisers Mime Ministry from Robersonville followed with a celebratory performance in Mime. Gospel mime is a combination of praise song and mime that was formally introduced to African American worship in the 1990's.

Dyreek Carter, an MCC Student then introduced the guest speaker, Samuel K. Shaw, III. Shaw, the Pastor of Mount Olive Missionary Baptist Church in Windsor, delivered an inspiring message on persevering.

The audience was treated to "A Walk in Fashion." Several MCC employees and their friends and family modeled Africainspired clothing and accessories.

Dr. Paul Hutchins, President of Martin Community College gave closing remarks. He thanked everyone for their participation in the event, especially Brenda G. Moore, who started the event 32 years ago. Moore, MCC's HRD Program Coordinator, is retiring in March of 2019.

The Riverside Gospel Choir returned to the stage to sing "Lift Every Voice and Sing" after which the audience congregated in the foyer to enjoy light refreshments and view a display of historic hair styles created by MCC's Cosmetology students.

Sue Gurley, MCC's Healthcare Program Coordinator, offered congratulatory remarks and encouraged the students to continue developing their health careers. Gurley noted that all of the students had shown great potential and strong commitment in the delivery of professional health care. Gurley was then joined by MCC's Dean of Continuing Education, Nathan Mizell, to distribute the certificates and personally congratulate each program completer.

Brenda Moore, MCC's Director of Human Resource Development (HRD) then recognized the students who earned a CRC (Career Readiness Certification) credential. Stacey Bennett attained Gold level CRC status. The gold level signifies that, based on the individual's scores on the WorkKeys test, the recipient possesses skills for approximately 85% of the jobs that have been profiled by WorkKeys in three specific skill areas: applied mathematics, locating information and reading for information. Taylor Foy, Regina Sanderlin, Destiny Latham, Jvan Harrell, Angelica Quinn, Deadra Brown, and Constance Williams each earned silver CRC status. Stacey Bennett earned a gold cord.

Career readiness certification (CRC) was developed to help employees gain skills and to help employers make better decisions during the hiring process. North Carolina issues career readiness certificates to individuals who have taken the WorkKeys tests and tested at or above the third WorkKeys level on all three tests. In North Carolina, there are four career readiness certification levels: bronze, silver, gold and platinum. MCC offers CRC test preparation on both its Williamston and Windsor campuses. CRC testing is Mondays available on and Wednesdays on the Williamston campus.

Dean Mizell congratulated the students and thanked the many family members and friends in the

audience for their support of the Health Care Program completers. His comments were immediately followed by the recessional.

Many of the students intend to use their health care education from MCC as a stepping stone to higher career goals. Most of the students are already working as CNA's (Certified Nursing Assistant). The Vintage Inn Nursing Home in Williamston, Vidant Medical Center in Greenville, East Carolina Rehab in Greenville, Vidant Hospital Beaufort, and Quality Home Staffing are among the employers utilizing MCC health care personnel.

When asked how they felt about their training experience, NA I student Stacey Bennett noted, "This class has made me feel confident that as my parents age, I can take care of them as well as they cared for me."

Allicia Hassell stated, "For me, this training means a pay raise and bigger opportunities at my job."

Perhaps Healthcare Billing & Coding Part II completer, Laura Mack of Bertie, said it best, "MCC has changed my life... I lost everything, but WIOA (Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act) paid my tuition for two Billing and Coding classes. I have already been called in for an interview. I'm blessed."

# **MCC's IST Advisory Board Meets**



The Advisory Board for MCC's Industrial Systems Technology (IST) program met on February 28. These leaders of local businesses and industries shared their expertise with College Instructors and Administrators in planning and developing MCC's IST program for the upcoming academic year. Pictured far right is Dr. Evonne Carter, Vice President of Learning at College of the Albemarle. Dr. Carter started the meeting with DACUM (an acronym for Developing a Curriculum) training. The Advisory Board used this training to assist them in making plans and recommendations for the program.

Six local Business and Industry leaders assisted MCC in planning and developing its Advanced Manufacturing program on February 28. Those in attendance included David Bowen (Bowen Heating, Air and Refrigeration), Jay Bryant and Alonza Roberson (Roberson's Heating and Air Conditioning), Jaret Warren (Metcore), Randy Brown (Penco), and Brian Dickens (United Refrigeration).

The programs of study within the Advanced Manufacturing Department are Air Conditioning, Heating, and Refrigeration Technology, Electrical Systems Technology, Industrial Systems Technology (IST), and Automotive Systems Technology (AST). The AST program did not participate in this meeting because it has its own Advisory Board.

The meeting started with DACUM training (an acronym for Developing A Curriculum). DACUM uses a focus group to capture the major duties and related tasks included in a specific occupation, as well as, the necessary knowledge, skills, and traits. The training was led by Dr. Evonne Carter, Vice President of Learning at College of the Albemarle.

During this time, a chart was developed. It identified the specific duties and tasks that competent workers must perform in the Advanced Manufacturing arena. Among the identified duties were: installation and maintenance of HVAC (Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning Welding (particularly units), GRAW, SMAW, and GMAW), WiFi Programming, Low and High Voltage Electrical installation and maintenance, Engineering, Designing, Machining, Metal Fabrication. Programming, Additive Manufacturing, Finishing Processes, and Logistics.

The essential tasks and knowledge needed to perform these duties were also listed on the chart. A basic grasp of physics was repeatedly identified as being necessary to successfully completing the duties. Safe handling of tools came up frequently as well as the need for organizational skills and craftsmanship.


Once the chart was completed, a chart of specific job skills was developed. These included: safety training as it relates to OSHA, Customer Service, Punctuality, Problem Solving, Blueprint Reading, Metal Theory, Productivity, Communication, Courtesy, Soft Skills, Math, Reading Manuals and Project Management.

Lastly, the group identified the essential tools needed for training. This list included hand tools, volt meters, vacuum pumps, recovery machines, dehumidifiers, calipers, tape measures, refrigeration gauges, scales, micron gauges, micrometers, and pressure testing anemometers.

This information will now provide vital guidance for MCC's Advanced Manufacturing Faculty and Staff as they develop their curriculum and budget for the 2019-2020 academic year.

MCC is very thankful for the advisory board's input. Their insights will certainly be helpful in developing relevant programs and employable graduates!
