Comments: Medical Assisting Licensure Information: While most medical assistants seek voluntary certification, no state requires medical assistants to be licensed.

Most states do not have a formal education requirement for medical assistants. Formal medical assisting training programs are available from community colleges, vocational schools, and technical institutes.

Formal medical assisting programs typically lead to either a certificate or a diploma. They do not confer any type of medical assistant license. Medical assistants are not required by law to hold licensure or certification.

Medical assisting is not typically a state-licensed/certified profession. This means that medical assistants do not typically need specific credentials to practice in the field. The only exception to this includes medical assistants who perform specific duties, such as phlebotomy or x-rays, as state laws may require specific training and certification in these areas.

- American Association of Medical Assistants (AAMA) - Certified Medical Assistant
- National Healthcareer Association (NHA) - Certified Clinical Medical Assistant
- American Medical Technologists (AMT) - Registered Medical Assistant
- The National Center for Competency Testing (NCCT) - National Certified Medical Assistant (NCMA)
