**PROGRAM TITLE:** College Transfer

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course provides an overview of the scientific study of human behavior. Topics include history, methodology, biopsychology, sensation, perception, learning, motivation, cognition, abnormal behavior, personality theory, social psychology, and other relevant topics. Upon completion, students should be able to demonstrate a basic knowledge of the science of psychology. *This course has been approved to satisfy the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement general education core requirement in social/behavioral sciences.* 

#### **LEARNING OUTCOMES**

- 1. Demonstrate appropriate mathematical skills required for academic and work- related tasks.
- 2. Apply principles of sound critical thinking to analyze and solve problems and make logical decisions.
- 3. Demonstrate effective speaking, writing and reading skills.
- 4. Demonstrate appropriate technology skills required for academic and work-related tasks.

### **COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES**

- 1. Apply major research methods in psychology.
- 2. Recognize, understand, and respect the complexity of sociocultural and international diversity as it relates the human behavior.
- 3. Demonstrate psychological knowledge, skills and values in various personal and occupational settings.

**LEARNING/TEACHING METHODS:** This course will be taught in a lecture/discussion format. Students are expected to read the chapter to be discussed before coming to class. Students will be assigned outside reading assignments. Students are responsible for all material presented in the class including videos, hand-outs, outside reading assignments etc.

#### **ASSESMENTS:**

1. <u>TESTS:</u> There will be four tests. Tests will consist of multiple choice questions. Tests will cover all assigned readings including outside reading assignments, videos and discussions in the class. The tests must be taken on scheduled time period. To be considered for a make up test, you must provide a legitimate documentation (doctor's note, court papers etc.). You must make up the test within one week.

2. <u>HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENTS</u>, <u>DISCUSSION BOARDS AND QUIZZES</u>: There will be a quiz for every chapter that will be covered. Quizzes will consist of 10 multiple choice and short answer questions. Quizzes will be posted on blackboard. If you don't take the quizzes by the due dates, you will get a zero. In some chapters there will be outside reading assignments and written homework assignments related to these materials. Homework assignments must be **typed** and turned in on **due dates**. Ten points will be taken for each late day.

For every chapter covered, there will be discussion board assignments on Blackboard which also require outside readings. You must complete discussion board assignments by due dates

The lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

3.<u>FINAL EXAM</u>: The final exam will be comprehensive and it will be optional. If you take the final exam, Your lowest test grade will be dropped.

STUDENT ATTENDANCE POLICY: Students must be present at least one class during first ten percent(10%) of the course in order to be considered enrolled in the class.
